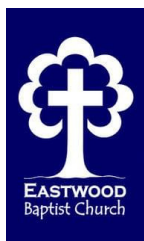

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1. Ministers Report - Rev. Martin W.

As you read through this year's report, I invite you to do more than simply look back over the events and activities of the past year. Instead, take a moment to reflect on where you have seen the wonder of God among us.

At the beginning of the year, we set out with a simple hope: that we would grow as a people of wonder. The Oxford Dictionary defines wonder as “a feeling of amazement and admiration, caused by something beautiful, remarkable, or unfamiliar.” Our prayer was that, as a church, we would become more aware of these moments, that our eyes would be opened to the beauty of God, the remarkable work of His Spirit, and the unfamiliar ways He might invite us to trust and follow Him. I believe that true wonder does not stop at amazement, but naturally leads our hearts into worship.

Throughout the year we explored four areas together: the wonder of God Himself, the wonder of His church, the wonder of prayer, and the wonder of who God has created each of us to be. Through our Sunday gatherings, house groups, conversations, and times of prayer, we sought to create space to pause and recognise God's presence and activity among us.

My hope is that this report does more than simply summarise a year. Instead, may it help us recognise the many ways God has been at work among us. And as we notice those moments, may our response continue to be one of wonder and worship for who He is and what He is doing in His church.

2. Secretary's Report - Val S.

2025, was a Wonderful year in so many ways, Martin has already highlighted the topics we looked at during the year. Throughout the year, we had 5 baptisms, that of Chloe, Bea, Claire, Holly and Willow in which we thank God for. Something new was our Day of Prayer held on the 11th January where we could reflect, pray and be creative in a variety of ways.

The Manse needed new windows so we held many fundraising events during the year, starting with Easter knitted chicks with eggs, More on fundraising can be found within these reports.

It has been wonderful too, to meet twice a month with the Deacons to discern the business issues of the church along with praying for all of you. In May, Val and Graham stepped away from being Deacons and leading our Pastoral work, in which they did so faithfully well. Nicky joined the team and has been a wonderful asset to the leadership of EBC.

On the Sundays when Martin was away we had a wonderful group of preachers both from within our fellowship and outside. Thanks are given to all these and especially to Steve, Jonathan, Neil, and Claire. Also I would like to say thank you to Paul and Laura, who have stepped up in a wonderful way with their gift of leading us in worship.

In September our dear sister Pam Freeman had her home call, a wonderful christian lady who devoted her time to teaching our Sunday school for over 40 years, plus helping with running the flower ministry.

In October, we also held a 'Light party' where Martin had created some wonderful games and experiments, this as an alternative to halloween. During the year, we celebrated Easter, Harvest and Christmas, and had many visitors from our neighbourhood, including schools and care homes. December, and Advent was again a wonderful time, Our Carols by Candlelight has been noted as being one of the best we have had. An amazing and wonderful choir, thank you to all those who took part and read.

Our Christingle service was again such joy, with Martin and Neil, and help from Al. Then our Christmas service with wonderful cracker jokes!. The last service along with Rosie, we both looked back at the year of WONDER. Once again it has been a pleasure to serve you all as EBC Secretary.



3. Treasurer's Report - Andrew E.

Income for 2025 was £78043.05 against a budget of £62000.00.

This included a legacy of £10000.00, fundraising of £1736.26 and gift day donations of £3450.00. Electronic offering receipts were £35557.00 and bag offerings were £6874.00.

Hall Hire income was £10671.00 and we received a gift aid refund of £8804.33. Other income was donations of £4041.90.

We repaid £10000.00 back into our Baptist union 7 day deposit account which we had withdrawn in December 2024 to cover the cost of the manse windows.

Our thanks go to Rosie and helpers for the August afternoon tea which raised £467.00 and to Graham and helpers for organising the auction which raised £633.38 Our thanks are also due to Val Statt for supplying the Christmas tree,

Expenditure for the year was £40475.68 on ministry £11131.18 on manse of which £7336.00 was for windows (deposit had been paid in 2024).

We spent £3284.95 on church maintenance which did not include the hedge trimming which was completed in January 2026.

4. Website - Kim W.

Our website offers a wealth of possibilities, although it is not yet being fully utilised. We do our best to keep it welcoming, friendly, and up to date, and we remain hopeful about its potential as a central hub for our church community.

All events are regularly added to the website and updated on the calendar, providing one place to see everything that's happening. We also have access to a member-only area, along with a church directory for easy reference.

One particularly useful feature is the rota function, which sends automated email reminders 2–3 days before someone is scheduled to volunteer, helping everyone stay on top of their commitments. In addition, newsletters and photos from events are uploaded to the site, making it easy to stay informed and connected.

We're encouraged by what the website can offer and invite you to explore it more as it continues to grow and develop.

5. Newsletter - Kim W.

In 2025, we have continued producing our monthly newsletter using Mailchimp. All emails sent via Mailchimp have been successfully delivered, with an average open rate of 53.33%. In addition, 13.33% of recipients are actively clicking through links in the newsletter, directing them to our website and other online content.

Alongside the emailed version, our printed newsletter continues to play an important role for those who are not on email. We regularly print 18 copies at the beginning of each month, which are made available in church for anyone who would like one. We no longer deliver newsletters to people in their homes.

The printed edition remains shorter than the emailed version, with some content—such as youth and children’s work—omitted to better suit this format.

6.Homegroups

Monday Evening - Jo K.

We are blessed to maintain contact and friendship with dear Maheen and Jonathan.

As you can see from our summer barbecue they blessed us with a delicious cake!

We choose to meet in the vestry at the rear of the church as easily accessible but do use the lower hall during the summer and for our Christmas celebration.

Having guidance from Martin each week has enabled us to develop our reading skills, prayer life together and Bible knowledge. As we also get to know each other better we are also more confident in sharing with one another.

During the summer we enjoyed the book club, using “The Rest is Worship” by Sarah and Sam Hargreaves. This group is an open one and it’s lovely to have other voices during that time.



Tuesday Evening Home Group - Val S.

During 2025 we met at Margaret's home where she always makes us very welcome. It has been encouraging to see all develop their prayer life. We keep a log of our prayers and see how our God has answered over the weeks and months.

One of the highlights of the year was our summer trip to a beach hut. We were blessed with lovely weather, enjoyed games and food together, and finished the day with a paddle in the sea.

Energise is our Friday night youth group, welcoming around 10 to 15 young people each week.

This year has been a season of change, with some young people moving on and new faces joining the group. Alongside our regular gatherings, we have enjoyed a variety of activities including sleepovers, trips out, evenings around the fire pit, jewellery making, and much more.

Many of the young people from this group also joined us for our summer camp.

Youth Camp

This year we attended Satellites, a youth camp run by Youthscape. We took 12 young people with us, the largest group we have taken so far.

In preparation for the trip, the young people worked hard to help fundraise through events such as bake sales and cooking meals for the church. The camp itself was a wonderful experience. The young people fully engaged in the activities, teaching, and worship, and it was encouraging to see them grow in confidence and faith during the week.



11. Fabric and Health and Safety - David F.

The normal yearly procedures for fire alarm testing, emergency lighting, fire extinguisher checking and gas safety checks were carried out. 2 replacement fire extinguishers were obtained and fitted.

I am pleased to report we strive to keep the church premises and facilities in good condition. We keep our regular statutory safety requirements up to date.

16. Pinocchio's Toddler Group - Christina P.

Pinocchio toddler group's year began with the usual two sessions on Monday and Fridays.

Martin kindly stepped in on Friday's for 2 terms until July 2025 as Shelagh and Jan stepped away after their dedicated time to the group for many years.

Jo Keeble joined the group in September 2025 and we now meet on Monday's at 10.30 to 12 with support from our regular tea ladies Carol and Sharon. Martin also pops in once a month to tell a bible story and help out.

The group continues to thrive with up to 16 children and their carers attending. We offer a variety of floor and table top toys/resources eg playdough table, puzzles, small world toys, cars building blocks, painting and usual craft table weekly, dotty pics, autumn time, music shakers, sock puppets, Christmas crafts, a physical play session, crosses for Easter. There is also a baby area.

The routine of the session is free play for 45 mins then tidy up time then we all go downstairs for storytime together led by Jo. or myself followed by tea and biscuits, then circle time with a choice of nursery rhymes.

At the end of the summer term we held a small animal visit.

It's so lovely to welcome parents/grandparents to build up relationships together with us and themselves while the children play and make friends.

Please continue to pray for us as we welcome young families to the group and have opportunities to share our faith in simple ways.



17. Men's Breakfast - Graham B.

This was another year in which many guys enjoyed regular breakfasts and conversations at The Oakwood, with as many as 30 sometimes coming.

What has continued to happen is that although many EBC guys come to the breakfasts, there have been men from as many as nine other churches, and from no church, sometimes from as far away as Canvey Island, also coming. This has also helped to enhance our conversations and to help to build and cement relationships.

Towards the end of the year we became aware that the current management at The Oakwood would be leaving at some time in the future, and we pray that our sessions will still be available in the future.



18. Ladies Breakfast - Val S.

Throughout 2025 the ladies met 6 times for breakfast at The Oakwood pub in Eastwood. A time for ladies to catch up over breakfast, a special treat for their busy days. We have ladies from Leighfields as well and all ages are very welcome. A great opportunity to share, encourage one another.

As always Sally and her team make us so very welcome and cater for the many variations of a traditional breakfast!.

19. Trussell Trust Foodbank - Martin W.

For over four years, our church has had the privilege of serving as a distribution centre for Southend Foodbank. During this time, we have witnessed the profound impact this ministry has had on many individuals and families in need. Each person who came through our doors was not only provided with food, but also met with warmth, care, and practical support by a dedicated team. We want to express our sincere thanks to all those who have volunteered, given, and supported this work over the years.

In the past two years, the Southend on Sea Trussell Trust Foodbank has faced increasing challenges, as the level of donations has not kept pace with the growing demand. This has resulted in additional costs of up to £2,000 per month to ensure that needs could still be met.

Due to this ongoing pressure, alongside a reduction in available grants, the Trust has undertaken a review to ensure the long term sustainability of the foodbank. As part of this process, it was decided that four distribution centres, including ours, would need to close. This will help reduce staffing pressures and allow resources to be focused where the need is greatest

While this marks the end of this chapter for us as a distribution centre, we are deeply grateful for the partnership we have shared with the Trussell Trust and for the opportunity to serve our community in this way. We remain committed to supporting the foodbank in its new structure, trusting that it will continue to provide vital help to those who are most vulnerable.

20. Shoebox Project 2025 - Sharon W.

This year our Christmas Shoebox Appeal was launched on 14th September in our Sunday morning service. As in previous years we were supporting Samaritan's Purse charity. Prior to this Rosie and Sharon attended a coffee morning launch in Rayleigh to hear more about the work behind the boxes and to feel encouraged and excited to take on the challenge this year. The volunteers are amazing people tirelessly giving their time, skills and focus to the work.

At EBC people were encouraged to look online so they could explore the idea of filling a shoebox with gifts organised through the website. This has benefits in that it reduces transport costs, manpower and counting money. Several people reported that they had done this.

We collected in the shoeboxes on Sunday 16th November. There were 57 (51 last year) physical shoe boxes, 22 from Kingsway and approx 6 online so at least 85, which is around our normal number. Given the economic circumstances this was really good. Rosie kindly transported them to the depot in Rayleigh to begin their long journey to the children for whom they were created.

Internationally 12,205,900 boxes were collected in, 232,844 from the UK.

22.Safe Haven Community Cafe - Graham B.

This was a year in which the regular monthly free sessions continued to become more popular, with people coming for purely social reasons, alongside others with dementia needs and their carers. We regularly provided craft activities, games, quizzes, refreshments and nail treatment for some (!). We also did occasional things such as, singalongs, chair exercise, food specials at Christmas and Wimbledon, and other things linked to particular times of the year.

This year we welcomed many new guests, coming from several different sources....care homes, Elizabeth House, referrals from dementia navigators from Southend Council, and recent advertising.

What had been a steady increase in numbers really accelerated towards the end of the year. This means that there is a need going into 2026 for many more things to be set up and provided by the volunteer team, and more guests who need entertaining. So we need more volunteers- not just for the physical needs of setting things up and putting away after the sessions, but also to be there during the sessions to chat with and listen to people.



23. Sound and Media - Kim W.

In 2025, our approach to sound and media has continued to develop and adapt to the needs of our church and our volunteer team.

We are now recording our services and uploading them to the church website on the weeks when we do not have live worship, which is roughly every other week, provided there are no technical issues. This revised rhythm has helped us balance consistency with sustainability for our volunteers.

During 2025, Laura and Paul began leading us in live worship, bringing new energy and musical leadership to our services. Paul has also played a key role in improving our technical setup by configuring the sound desk so that all band instruments and microphones are linked into a single port. This has made the system far more streamlined, and our sound volunteers have adapted extremely well, with little to no disruption.

Paul now acts as our sound desk technical lead, continually supporting and training the team and helping us to grow in confidence and skill. We are very grateful for his ongoing commitment and willingness to teach.

As always, we remain in need of additional volunteers to assist with both the PC and sound desk. Thank you to everyone who already gives their time so generously to support the sound and media aspects of our services—your dedication is truly appreciated.

24. Sunflowers Sunday Group - Nicky H

This year, a number of our youngest members have started school and Sunflowers has therefore increased in numbers. We have a wide range of ages, with the youngest enjoying a story and some craft and the older ones becoming deep thinkers during discussion times. It has been lovely watching our previously youngest children growing into caring and thoughtful members of our church, who help with the little ones and work together as a family.

This year we have covered a number of topics including the Christian Character, where we looked at developing godly characteristics such as patience, love and gratitude. We also spent some time thinking about what it means to be the Body of Christ.

This has been an important school year for many of our young people, whether they have begun school for the first time or they are preparing to sit Sat's exams. For this reason we spent some time in September thinking about how to deal with stress, how to thrive in the school environment and how to make a positive impact on our friends and teachers.

As always, it has been a pleasure to walk alongside our wonderful young people as they begin their journey with Christ.



25. Day of Prayer - Val S.

We held a Prayer Day on Saturday 11th January, which gave opportunities for everyone to come to be still or be creative and pray for the various prayers which had been put forward from the groups within the church. Those attending found it helpful, and took time at each of the stations to reflect.

These covered; Worship, Thankfulness, Intercession and Contemplation. The aim was to help those to be encouraged to develop deeper relationships with God.

One day Jesus was praying in a certain place. When he had finished, one of his disciples said to him, "Lord, teach us to pray, just as John taught his disciples"

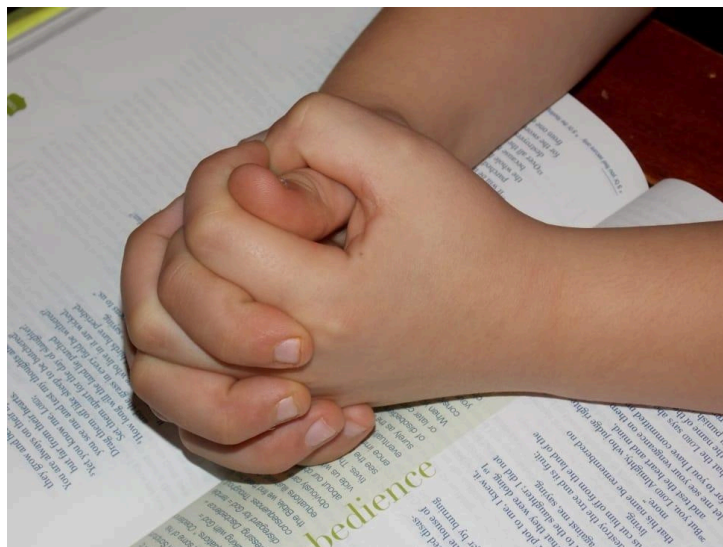
He said to them, "When you pray say:

It was so encouraging to see that our primary target had been met and monies added to our church funds following the purchase of the Manse Windows. Thank you to everyone who contributed.



28. Women's Social Group - Kim W.

Twelve months on, the women's group continues to be an active and valued part of church life. The group operates as a WhatsApp community for all ladies of, and connected with, EBC. There is no designated leader, and the group is run collectively, with all members equally able to suggest activities, plan trips, and invite others to join.

Since its start in early 2023, the group has grown into a warm and welcoming network, fostering friendship and connection beyond organised church activities. While 2025 saw a reduction in the number of larger, organised events, the group has remained active and engaged. Members have continued to meet informally for meals, craft evenings, walks, theatre trips, and a variety of outings, all coordinated through the WhatsApp group.

The continued interaction within the group reflects its ongoing relevance and the value it brings in supporting relationships and community among the women of EBC.



29.BMS Birthday Scheme - Rosie M.

We all have a birthday and many of those are mentioned in church as we join in singing 'Happy Birthday' to those celebrating in the coming week.

The Baptist Worldwide Mission benefits from those who choose to acknowledge others in much less fortunate circumstances by giving a birthday gift rather than receiving one. It's a simple idea, enroll in the scheme and each birthday you will receive a lovely card with good wishes and information to keep you updated on BMS work. It is accompanied by an envelope in which you put your gift.

I have been in the scheme for over 65 years as my parents supported this scheme too and so pocket money on birthday week went into the envelope. It's a simple way of teaching children [and ourselves] how to give to others they will never see.



30.Care Home Services - Rev Martin W

Over the years our care home ministry has continued to develop, and we now hold services in both Havengore and Brooklands care homes. These gatherings include familiar hymns, a Bible reading, and a short message or story to encourage and uplift the residents.

After the service we spend time chatting with the guests, which has become a very meaningful part of the visit. This ministry has been deeply valued not only by the residents but also by those involved in serving.



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
